The Youth Ambassadors for Community Services is a leadership program for French high school students with previous community involvement. The program consists in an associative or civic project and a 15-day trip to the United States, including a week with an American family in Florida or Missouri.

Smithsonian in France 2024

Sustainable Communities, how will we help our community thrive?

The U.S. Embassy in France, Smithsonian's Office of International Relations, and Smithsonian Science Education Center have developed a unique program for students and educators to connect across the Atlantic and focus on sustainability issues. This program designed for 13+ French and U.S. students engages classrooms in English-conducted virtual exchanges.



The Benjamin Franklin Transatlantic Fellowship

The Benjamin Franklin Transatlantic Fellowship is a one-month summer program at Purdue University in Lafayette, USA for committed French people aged 16 and 18, who have demonstrated leadership skills and an interest in international issues, diplomacy or public policy.

One year ago, President of France Emmanuel Macron launched French for All, an initiative founded on the principle that foreign language education should be a right, not a privilege. The initiative supports the expansion and enrichment of French language education and bilingualism in the United States from kindergarten through higher education.

French In Higher Education complements the set of programs that the Embassy of France in the United States manages or promotes.

These programs are dedicated to increasing U.S. student mobility to France from the Bachelor's to the PhD level, and to furthering cooperation in teaching and research between French and U.S. institutions.

The Transatlantic Mobility **Program**

The French Embassy in the United States and the Embassy of the United States of America in France work together to increase Franco-American cooperation between French and U.S. Higher Education Institutions with Grants up to \$20,000 to expand and diversify study-abroad programs. University proposals are evaluated on how projects can effectively and concretely build strong partnerships, develop innovative and sustainable study-abroad models, and design programs for nontraditional students.



MICEFA

The Mission Inter-universitaire de Coordination des Echanges Franco-Américains and its partners work at creating student exchanges based on strict reciprocity with over 60 American universities. With the support of the U.S. Embassy in France, MICEFA provides twenty French university students with scholarships to help fund their exchange abroad, based on their academic excellence, the strength of their project, and financial need.



Fulbright

The Fulbright Program, established by Senator J. William Fulbright in 1946 to favor intercultural understanding, awards scholarships to Americans and citizens of partner countries for studying, teaching, or conducting research abroad. Co-financed by the respective governments and administered in France by the Franco-American Commission for Educational and Cultural Exchange, the Fulbright Program has supported more than 22,000 individuals from France and the United States.



Benjamin A. Gilman **International Scholarship**

The U.S. Department of State's Benjamin A. Gilman International Scholarship Program enables U.S. students of limited financial means to study or intern abroad, providing them with skills critical to national security and economic prosperity. To be eligible for the Gilman Program, applicants must be receiving a Federal Pell Grant during the time of application or provide proof that they will be receiving a Pell Grant during the term of their study abroad program or internship. The Institute of International Education has administered the program since its inception in 2001.
